This is a lengthy process; there are many details about the scope of the job still to be resolved.

Shell Renovations and Seasons Corner Store

Both the Rte 20 Shell station (at the base of our hill) and the Lincoln Street location are in the process of being remodeled. In addition to expanding the pumps, Shell will be installing a Seasons Corner Market.

There are currently more than 30 Seasons markets in Massachusetts, Rhode Island and New Hampshire. Shell's corner market concept began in 2012. Deadline is October 1st! Further Update on Furnace Offer from MassSave

Editor's Note: As noted in the last Village View, seven (now eight) residents have expressed interest in a new MassSave Multi-Family program in which MassSave would work with utilities to facilitate upgrading heating and air conditioning equipment. MassSave would also streamline the process in applying for the heat loan, as well as the rebates that would be associated with installing the new equipment.

Over the past few years, a growing number of Village residents have been installing new heating and AC units. This is because most of the units in the Villages were installed 20 years ago and are now far beyond their anticipated life spans. With this new program, residents can use any MassSave-approved Furnace and AC installer they wish (a list of those installers is available from MassSave).

This letter is from Patrick Raftery, General Manager of Middlesex Cooling & Heating. Middlesex has installed a large number of units at the Villages.

Raftery wrote that Middlesex is currently installing Heat and AC systems at the Villages for \$10,975. According to MassSave, there is a \$1,000 rebate available on the furnace. (There is also a higher priced furnace that receives a \$1,250 rebate.) For the AC, there is a \$50 rebate per ton (\$100 for a two-ton system). Additionally, according to Raftery, residents can deduct \$350 for payments other than credit cards. Raftery added that he expects a price increase on October 1st.

If you want to proceed with this MassSave program, call Michael Seder 508-768-7912 of MassSave to set up a time for him to visit your unit and provide the paperwork you need. This needs to be done before installation.

Road repairs begin next week

This week, ARR-MAX Road Repair will be dropping off their equipment in the visitor spots at the top of the hill. Work will begin in the lower villages on Monday, September 30th starting at 8:00 AM.

Driveways that are getting repairs will be notified by Dartmouth. (Note: Not all driveways need repairs.) Residents may have to park in visitors' spots, the right side of Village Drive or on the side of their Village while their driveways are being repaired. Do not park in the circles overnight. ARR-MAX will be working here several weeks. Residents are asked to be patient.

Effective November 1st, the Villages landscaping and snow removal will be done by J&J Sons Landscaping of Marlborough.

After reviewing bids from three landscaping firms (including Rosado Landscaping, which has been with the Villages for several years), the Board felt that J&J would best serve our Association. The Board did due diligence visiting vendors and their other client sites. The Board feels that with J&J, we will received high quality service at a slightly lower price than we had paid previously.

Note: Residents are reminded that it may take J&J at least two seasons to get acclimated to the property and to be patient during this learning curve.

Pump Station Update

Bob Cucchi has spoken with the city about the status of the Pump Station repairs at the entrance to the Villages.

He was told that the delay in the job has been caused by National Grid supplying power to the new station. The City expect National Grid to take care of the power this week.

Then the plan is to start paving within two weeks, followed by the landscaping. The target date is mid to late October but there are no guarantees.
